Derby's 25th Birthday Party



The 25th Anniversary of the founding of the Derby U3A was celebrated at the Friends Meeting House on 17 June 2010, with a bring and share lunch followed by an excellent performance of highlights from "The Gondoliers", given by members of the Matlock Gilbert and Sullivan Society. A large celebratory iced cake had been ordered and was duly delivered on an impressive looking silver stand. The cake was cut by two of the original founder members of Derby U3A, Joyce Allman and Beryl Beard, both of whom are still Group tutors, together with assistance from Vera Fowler, another long standing member. Everyone present enjoyed a slice of cake with their tea or coffee, with plenty left over to save for members unable to be present.

Derby U3A began life in early 1985, thanks to the inspiration and hard work of the late Margaret Johnson, a retired local headmistress. Meetings were held fortnightly in the Friends Meeting House, the location we still use today for many of our activities. Talks and visits were arranged and by the time of the first AGM in February 1986 there were 34 members and 3 groups – Arts and Music, Conversational German and Computing.

Higham and Rushden's 1st Birthday Party

What a first birthday party! Twenty-nine groups displayed their activities, we were entertained by the Country Dancing Group showing their unbounded energy and skill with two dances, the Singing Group with an excellent choice of music which we all hummed for the rest of the day and the Play Reading Group giving us a taste of drama.

Our two Mayors were present for the whole afternoon, Councillor Val Newbury from Higham Ferrers and Councillor Carol Childs from Rushden, both of whom toured all the stands making wistful comments about joining the U3A when their tour of public duty is complete and they have more time. Both they and Margaret Elgood, Chair of Wellingborough U3A, who helped our U3A get off the ground, joined in the first anniversary cake cutting. Liz Wilson, the U3A East Midlands Regional Trustee also joined us for the afternoon. During the afternoon, 183 people took part in the activities of which 157 were members. Seven more people joined the Branch making a total membership of 305, which must be a record for any organisation in its first year.

As usual in July, the Lunch Group had an evening meeting held at The Red Lion, East Haddon to include spouses who may not be members of the group and the September meeting is to be at The Spencer Arms. The Rambling Group has held successful walks at Little Brington, Great Addington, and Great Oxendon, as usual meeting at the local pub for coffee and returning for lunch. Future walks are planned for Yardley Hastings and Gumley.

Nottingham Castle Area Walk

As we moved down Castle Road we saw the next blot on the landscape, People's College, again built in the 1960s and resulting in the destruction of many old properties. We now reached the Trip to Jerusalem Inn, which has a date plaque of 1189, but Margaret assured us that it was built much later than this. We passed the Brewhouse Museum to reach the area at the foot of the Castle Rock to look at the numerous caves dug into the rock, which were used as early dwellings by the Snots of 'Snottingham.' At one time the River Leen flowed in front of the Castle Rock. Making our way back up Castle Road we saw some beautiful buildings on the right hand side designed by Watson Fothergill. These are now trendy bars and many of us looked at them longingly, but we were whisked past! We went up a flight of steps to Standard Hill where Charles I raised his standard at the beginning of the Civil War. It is sad that such an important event is only commemorated by a plaque on an adjacent wall and an inscription on a plaque in the road. Visiting tourists, or indeed residents of Nottingham, would have no idea that such a monumental event had taken place here.



We passed through the soulless blocks of flats built on the site of the old hospital and walked along Park Terrace. At its junction with Newcastle Drive is number 19 Park Terrace built by T C Hind in 1881 and which is perched precariously on the edge of Park Tunnel. This Tunnel was completed in 1855 and gave access from the Park residential development to Derby Road. However with a gradient of 1 in 12 it is unlikely that any carriages used the Tunnel. The pedestrian entrance to the Tunnel is via a spiral stone staircase of 96 steps from the top of College Street. Earlier Margaret had told us that many ladies who tried to end it all by jumping off the Castle Rock had landed safely thanks to their voluminous skirts acting as parachutes! We thought it would be interesting to put this to the test and persuade one of our lady members to jump from the top of the steps and record it on our new digital camera. Yes, you've guessed, she declined!!

Finally we made our way up the Tunnel to Derby Road, past St Barnabas R C Cathedral, from where it was a sprint finish by some to the watering hole adjacent to the Playhouse. We sat in the glorious sunshine chatting about our most interesting tour. **John Doar** Sherwood U3A

South Lincolnshire Neighbourhood Group (SLiNG as one member affectionately termed it) is the joint link for various U3As: Bourne, The Deepings, Grantham, Sleaford, Spalding, Stamford and Welland.

On the 6th October, they invited Group Leaders from all Lincolnshire U3As to attend a Workshop and **over 100** came and took part in the activities. The day had 3 main aims:

1. To enable participants to discuss matters of mutual interest with colleagues having the same role.
2. To help participants learn from each other.
3. To help participants in their role in their U3A.

After an introduction by Ken Cater, participants were allocated to various “like subject” groups. For example the Reading/Writing/ Discussion Group was comprised of Leaders for Creative Writing/Detection in Crime/Discussion/Film Appreciation/Film, TV and Radio Discussion/Laughter Lines/Literature/Poetry/Play reading/Wills, Dicks and Harrys /Writing for Pleasure.

Each group had a large sheet with a “What Works Well?” column one side and an “Even Better If” adjoining it. Each group also had a sheet with questions, some pertinent to their group and some common across groups. For example the above group had: How do you include new members? Is there a level that the group reaches that would make taking in new members difficult? What decides the size of the group? If the group gets too big how do you split it? How do you encourage new group leaders? Do you divide duties? How do you select books/subjects?

Each group had a facilitator who noted Key Points, which were then announced to all, in summarised form by Bob Cawson. Feedback forms asked for evaluation against the aims and had the crucial question: “**How do you consider we could most profitably carry things forward?**” Alan Morris is going to summarise the responses. and he made the formal closing remarks.

However, for me, the remark I heard on the way out summed up the 2 hours experience. “**That’s given me insight, inspiration and ideas for new initiatives**”. Would that all meetings were so worthwhile!
